



## **Taxometric Graphics Output for Gender Indicators**




*Figure A1.* Anthropometric measurements: Height, shoulder width, and waist:hip ratio. Mean above minus below a cut (A) was slightly peaked, maximum eigenvalue (B) was clearly peaked, and latent mode (C) was unimodal. Bayesian probabilities (D) accurately sorted men and women.




*Figure A2.* Sexual attitudes and behaviors: Average of appeal of sex with more than one partner and appeal of sex with a stranger, would not have sex without love (reversed), orgasm frequency, thoughts of sex frequency, masturbation frequency. Mean above minus below a cut (A) and maximum eigenvalue (B) curves were nonpeaked, latent mode (C) was not clearly bimodal (set to search for right mode beyond a factor score of 1). The Bayesian distribution (D) appeared U-shaped and sorted men and women with some accuracy, but this was the only evidence for taxonicity.




*Figure A3.* Mate Selectivity (Run 1): Mean of importance of similar education, education and intelligence, good financial prospect, ambition and industriousness, favorable social status; mean of number of children desired, desire for home and children, preferred marriage age (reversed); mean of dependable character, emotional stability, pleasing disposition; good looks (reversed); and good cook (reversed). Mean above minus below a cut (A) was nonpeaked, and maximum eigenvalue (B) and latent mode (C) were indiscernible. Bayesian probabilities (D) showed a large proportion of the sample with a high probability of taxon membership made up mostly of women, but an even distribution of the sample throughout the rest of the probabilities.




*Figure A4.* Mate Selectivity (Run 2): Importance of dependable character, emotional stability, desire for home and children, ambition, good looks (reversed), and finances. Mean above minus below a cut (A) and maximum eigenvalue (B) curves were nonpeaked, and latent mode (C) was unimodal. Bayesian probabilities (D) distinguished two groups, with a complement group low in mate selectivity composed mostly of men.




*Figure A5.* Sociosexual Orientation Inventory (Run 1): Number of one-night stands (capped at 30), frequency of fantasizing of someone other than partner, comfort with casual sex. Mean above minus below a cut (A) demonstrated a small peak at the far right, maximum eigenvalue (B) was nonpeaked, and latent mode (C) was unimodal. Bayesian probabilities (D) separated two groups, with a small-n high-sociosexuality taxon consisting mostly of men.




*Figure A6.* Sociosexual Orientation Inventory (Run 2): Number of partners foresee in next 5 years; number one-night stands; frequency of fantasizing of someone other than partner; average of comfort with sex without love, comfort with casual sex, requiring closeness for sex (reversed). Mean above minus below a cut (A) and maximum eigenvalue (B) curves were nonpeaked, and latent mode (C) was mostly unimodal. Bayesian probabilities (D) distinguished two groups, with approximately half the men and a few women in the high-sociosexuality taxon and most of the women and nearly half the men sorted into the low-sociosexuality complement.




*Figure A7.* Interpersonal Reactivity Index subscales (Run 1): Fantasy, Personal Distress, mean of Empathic Concern and Perspective Taking. Mean above minus below a cut (A) and maximum eigenvalue (B) were nonpeaked, and latent mode (C) was unimodal. Bayesian probabilities (D) presented a gap in the distribution, indicating a possible taxon, though not one that sorted men and women into different groups.





Mean above minus below a cut (A) and maximum eigenvalue (B) were nonpeaked, and latent mode (C) was mostly unimodal. Bayesian probabilities (D) demonstrated a large-n taxon, though there was no sorting according to sex.





Mean above minus below a cut (A) and maximum eigenvalue (B) curves were both nonpeaked, and latent mode (C) was unimodal. Bayesian probabilities (D) demonstrated a negatively skewed distribution, with little sorting according to sex.





Mean above minus below a cut (A) and maximum eigenvalue (B) curves were both nonpeaked, and latent mode (C) was unimodal. Bayesian probabilities (D) demonstrated a gap in the distribution, with little sorting by sex.







Mean above minus below a cut (A) was peaked to the far left, maximum eigenvalue (B) was gently peaked, and latent mode (C) was multimodal (setting to search for left mode beyond -1.5 and right mode beyond 1 standard deviation). Bayesian probabilities (D) placed a small portion of the sample in the lower range of the distribution, but demonstrated no sorting according to sex.




*Figure A13.* Masculinity (reversed), Femininity, Fear of Success. Mean above minus below a cut (A) and maximum eigenvalue (B) curves were nonpeaked, and latent mode (C) was unimodal. Bayesian probabilities (D) showed a somewhat U-shaped distribution, and although there appeared to be some sorting of women into the higher end, men appeared to be more evenly distributed.




*Figure A14.* Personal Attributes Questionnaire Masculinity items: Competitive, difficulty with decisions (reversed), never gives up, confident, feels superior, stands up under pressure. Mean above minus below a cut (A) and maximum eigenvalue (B) curves were nonpeaked, and latent mode (C) was unimodal. The Bayesian distribution (D) was somewhat U-shaped, with women more likely to be on the low end, but little sorting of men.




*Figure A15.* Personal Attributes Questionnaire Femininity items: Emotional, devote self to others, gentle, helpful, kind, aware of others' feelings, understanding, warm to others. Mean above minus below a cut (A) and maximum eigenvalue (B) curves were nonpeaked. Latent mode (C) was unimodal, though did detect a very small mode at the far left when setting to search beyond a factor score of -3.5. Bayesian probabilities (D) placed most of the sample near the center of the distribution and showed no sorting according to sex.





Mean above minus below a cut (A) and maximum eigenvalue (B) curves were nonpeaked, and latent mode (C) was unimodal. Bayesian probabilities (D) showed little sorting according to sex.









Mean above minus below a cut (A) and maximum eigenvalue (B) curves were nonpeaked, and latent mode (C) was unimodal. Bayesian probabilities (D) placed nearly the entire sample in a taxon, and a very small portion in the midrange, and an even smaller group at the low end.



*Figure A20.* Intimacy stage: Items 3, 4, 5 (reversed), 8, 15 (reversed), 16. Mean above minus below a cut (A) and maximum eigenvalue (B) curves were nonpeaked, and latent mode (C) was unimodal. The Bayesian distribution (D) demonstrated no discernibly taxonic pattern.



*Figure A21.* Modified Personal Assessment of Intimacy in Relationships Scale (Best Friend): Items 1, 3, 7 (reversed), 9 (reversed), 10, 12 (reversed), 14 (reversed), 16. Mean above minus below a cut (A) and maximum eigenvalue (B) curves were nonpeaked, but latent mode (C) was bimodal, set to search for a right mode beyond a factor score of 0.5. Bayesian probabilities (D) placed most people at the high end of the scale, with a small group in the middle of the distribution, and an even smaller group of men at the low end.



*Figure A22.* Social Provisions Scale: Items 9 (reversed), 15 (reversed), 17, 23, 24 (reversed). Mean above minus below a cut (A) and maximum eigenvalue (B) were nonpeaked, and latent mode (C) was unimodal. Bayesian probabilities (D) grouped almost the entire sample into one location on the distribution.

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
